He enlightens the light of the sun,
he strengthens the light of the night and the stars,

and neither is the Son younger than the Father,
nor is the Father older than the Son;

with those who had no place to lay their
heads. We pray for the thousands of
homeless men and women, old and young,
in our towns and in our cities.
Christ, in your mercy.

All: Hear our prayer.

Lay Reader: O Jesus, you belonged to a refugee family.
We pray for the millions of displaced people in
our world, and for the opening of borders to
the nationless.
Christ, in your mercy.

All: Hear our prayer.

Lay Reader: O Jesus, you cared for your companions and for the little ones who surrounded you. We pray for the dependent ones whom God has given us to care for.

Christ, in your mercy.

All: Hear our prayer.

Lay Reader: O Jesus, you who walk with the wounded along the road of our world's suffering, we seek your grace of healing for the broken people and places of our world.

Christ, in your mercy.

All: Hear our prayer.

Lay Reader: O Jesus, you prayed that we might be one as you and the Father are one. We pray that during this week we may feel at home with one another and with you in our midst.

Let us offer our own prayers
both spoken and unspoken

Christ in your mercy.

All: Hear our prayer.

Celebrant: Teach us now, O Christ, to pray as brothers and sisters...

**All: Our Father in heaven,
hallowed be your name,
your kingdom come,

Eucharistic Prayer A

The Invitation

Celebrant: At the Last Supper Jesus, sharing bread and wine, invited the disciples to share his journey. Like many grains of wheat becoming one loaf of bread, the disciples were invited to become one body with him. Here through bread and wine, we renew our journey with Jesus and his disciples. Here, through bread and wine, we renew our unity with the earth and our interwovenness with the broken ones of the world. So come, taste of this bread and wine, gifts of the earth, work of human hands, food both of earth and of heaven.

The Story of the Last Supper

Celebrant: Among friends, gathered round a table,
Jesus took bread,
and, having blessed it, he broke the bread
and gave it to his disciples, saying,
“This is my body which is given for you.”
In the same way he took wine, and,
having given thanks for it,
he poured it out and gave the cup to his
disciples, saying,
“This cup is the new relationship with God,
sealed with my blood.
Take this and share it. I shall drink wine with you
next in the coming Kingdom of God.”
So now, following Jesus’ example,
we take this bread and wine;
the ordinary things of the world
through which God will bless us.
And, as Jesus offered thanks for the gifts of the
earth, let us also celebrate God’s goodness.

The Blessing of Bread and Wine

Celebrant: Lord Jesus Christ present with us now,
as we do in this place what you did in an
upstairs room, breathe your Spirit upon us
and upon this bread and this wine,
that they may be heaven's food and drink for
us, renewing, sustaining and making us
whole, and that we may be your body on
earth, loving and caring in the world.

A Sign of Peace *(the congregation stands)*

Celebrant: Many grains were gathered together
to make this bread,
many grapes were mixed to make this wine,
so we who are many are one in Christ.
May the peace of Christ be with you.

All: And also with you!

FRACTION

Celebrant: The Body of Christ is broken
for the life of the world.
Here is Christ coming to us in bread and in
wine.

The Sharing of the Bread and Wine

The Gifts of God for the People of God.
All: Thanks be to God!

Saint Mark's has an open Communion policy. All Christians are welcome to join us at the Lord's table to receive the sacrament. Anglicans normally receive both a wafer of bread and a sip of wine. If you wish, you may receive just the bread at Communion. If you prefer not to receive the wine fold your arms across your chest until the chalice bearer has passed you. It is recommended that children between the ages of 5 and 7 do a First Communion Class before receiving communion, but children who are visiting and normally receive Communion in their own church are welcome to receive Communion here at St. Mark's. Parents interested in First Communion for their children should speak to the Rector.

Eucharistic Prayer B

The Invitation

Celebrant: The Lord be with you.

All: And also with you.

Celebrant: Lift up your hearts.

All: We lift them to the Lord.

Celebrant: Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

All: It is right to give our thanks and praise.

Celebrant: It is indeed right,
for you made us,
and before us, you made the world we inhabit,
and before the world,
you made the eternal home in which, through
Christ, we have a place.

All that is spectacular,
and all that is plain
have their origin in you;
all that is lovely,
all who are loving
point to you as their fulfillment.

And grateful as we are for the world we know
and the universe beyond our understanding,
we particularly praise you,
whom eternity cannot contain,
for coming to earth and entering time in Jesus.

For his life which informs our living,
for his compassion which changes our hearts,
for his clear speaking
which contradicts our harmless generalities,
for his enduring presence,
his innocent suffering,
his fearless dying,
his rising to life breathing forgiveness,
we praise you and worship him.

Here, too, our gratitude rises for the promise
of the Holy Spirit,
who even yet, even now,
confronts us with your claims
and attracts us to your goodness.

Therefore we gladly join our voices
to the song of the Church
on earth and in heaven:

**Holy, Holy, Holy Lord,
God of Power and Might.
Heaven and earth are full of your glory.
Hosanna in the highest.**

**Blessed is he who comes
in the name of the Lord.
Hosanna in the highest.**

Celebrant: And now,
lest we believe
that our praise alone fulfils your purpose,
we fall silent
and remember him who came
because words were not enough.
Setting our wisdom,
our will, our words aside,
emptying our hearts,
and bringing nothing in our hands,
we yearn for the healing,
the holding, the accepting, the forgiving
which Christ alone can offer.

(Silence)

Merciful God,
send now, in kindness,
your Holy Spirit to settle on this bread and
wine and fill them with the fullness of Jesus.
And let that same Spirit rest on us,
converting us
from the patterns of this passing world,
until we conform to the shape of him
whose food we now share.

Amen.

Fraction

Celebrant: Among friends, gathered round a table,
Jesus took bread, and broke it,
and said,
“This is my body - broken for you.”
Later he took a cup of wine and said,
“This is the new relationship with God
made possible because of my death.
Take it, all of you, to remember me.”

Jesus, firstborn of Mary,
All: Have mercy on us.
Celebrant: Jesus, Saviour of the world,
All: Have mercy on us.
Celebrant: Jesus, monarch of heaven,
All: Grant us peace.

Celebrant: He whom the universe could not contain,
is present to us in this bread.
He who redeemed us and called us by name
now meets us in this cup.
So take this bread and this wine.

The Invitation

Celebrant: The Lord is here.

It is indeed right, our duty and our joy
that we should always sing of your glory,
Holy Father, almighty and eternal God,
through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord.
For you are the hope of the nations,
the builder of the city that is to come.
Your love made visible in Jesus Christ
brings home the lost,
restores the sinner
and gives dignity to the despised.
In his face your light shines out,
flooding lives with goodness and truth,
gathering into one in your kingdom
a divided and broken humanity.
Therefore with all who can
give voice in your creation,
we glorify your name,
forever praising you and saying:

**Holy, holy, holy Lord,

Celebrant: We praise you, loving Father,

On the night before he died
he had supper with his friends,
and taking bread, he praised you.
He broke the bread, gave it to them and said:
“Take, eat, this is my body which is given for you;
do this in remembrance of me.”
When supper was ended he took the cup of wine.
Again, he praised you, gave it to them and said:
“Drink this, all of you;
This is my blood of the new covenant,
which is shed for you and for many
for the forgiveness of sins.
Do this, as often as you drink it,
in remembrance of me.”

So Father, we remember all that Jesus did,
in him we plead with confidence his sacrifice
made once for all upon the cross.
Bringing before you the bread of life
and cup of salvation,
we proclaim his death and resurrection
until he comes in glory.

Celebrant: Great is the mystery of faith:

O loving Father, for ever and ever.
